## Air India Boeing 787 Crash: Black-Box Investigation Underway

On June 12, 2025, Air India Flight AI 171, a Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner bound for London Gatwick, tragically crashed in Ahmedabad just seconds after take-off, killing 260 people—241 onboard and 19 on the ground—with only one survivor, British-Indian national Vishwesh Kumar Ramesh. The aircraft lost thrust and descended from approximately 625 ft before colliding with the hostel building of B.J. Medical College, erupting in a fireball seen and heard by nearby residents. Rescue teams swiftly recovered both flight recorders: the Cockpit Voice Recorder (CVR) on June 13 and the Flight Data Recorder (FDR) on June 16. These are now housed securely at a state-of-the-art AAIB lab in Delhi, established in April with HAL's support, and equipped to decode even damaged modules. From June 24 to 25,

officials—including the DG of AAIB, NTSB representatives, Boeing, and GE Aerospace—began extracting data from the Crash Protection Module and memory units. This multidisciplinary team is reconstructing final flight parameters—thrust, altitude, engine performance—and cockpit communications to determine the sequence of events. Meanwhile, the AAIB and a separate high-level panel led by the Home Secretary, are probing all potential causes—including mechanical failure, dual-engine thrust loss, bird strike, flap/landing-gear issues, contamination, or sabotage—with a preliminary report expected within 30 days, and a full report due in three months.



DGCA has also ordered extensive safety inspections of all 34 Boeing 787s in the Indian fleet; 12 inspections are complete with no urgent findings. Civil Aviation Minister Ram Mohan Naidu emphasized India's aviation standards are strict, reassuring travellers that domestic black-box capabilities are now robust—though overseas analysis remains a backup if required. As data analysis continues, the investigation aims to shed light on what may be one of the most perplexing and impactful air disasters in recent Indian history—ensuring that lessons are swiftly learned to enhance future aviation safety.

## "Stars Within Reach": Shubhanshu Shukla Becomes India's Second Astronaut in Space

On June 25, 2025, Group Captain Shubhanshu Shukla of the Indian Air Force made history as the first Indian to travel to the International Space Station (ISS) aboard Axiom Mission 4—just 41 years after Rakesh Sharma's 1984 mission. Launched from NASA's Kennedy Space Centre on a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket, the Crew Dragon "Grace" docked at the ISS on June 26, marking a major milestone in India's human spaceflight journey. Born in Lucknow on October 10, 1985, Shukla is a seasoned test pilot with over 2,000 flight hours in aircraft like the Sukhoi-30MKI and MiG-29. Selected in 2019 for training in Russia, NASA, and ESA facilities, he was officially announced by PM Modi as one of India's astronaut-designates in February 2024. Onboard the ISS, Shukla is conducting seven India-specific experiments, including cultivation of fenugreek (methi) and moong daal in microgravity—a significant stride in space agriculture. He is also investigating tardigrades, muscle atrophy, and



terrestrial stress-testing devices. Overall, the mission hosts over 60 experiments from 31 countries, underscoring its scientific significance. A highlight: during a live ISS interaction on June 28, Shukla described India from orbit as "truly majestic," noting the absence of visible borders and emphasizing global unity. PM Modi echoed national pride, saying, "Even though he may be far, the hearts of 1.4 billion Indians beat with him". This mission holds profound significance for India. With an estimated ₹550 crore investment, it strengthens India-US collaboration and provides vital experience ahead of Gagan Yaan, India's own crewed program planned for 2027. Shukla's journey is not just a personal triumph—it's a national launchpad toward independent human space exploration.

## Record-Early Monsoon Covers India: A Mixed Blessing for Agriculture and Economy

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) confirmed that the southwest monsoon covered the entire country by June 26, 2025, more than a week ahead of the usual schedule. This is one of the earliest monsoon arrivals in recent years, bringing both optimism and challenges for the agriculture sector and the broader economy. The monsoon is crucial for India, where nearly 55% of the cultivated area depends on rainfall. Early rainfall typically boosts sowing activities for key crops like rice, pulses, cotton, and oilseeds, offering hope for a strong kharif (summer crop) season. Rural communities, especially small farmers, welcome the timely showers as they reduce dependence on costly irrigation and enhance soil moisture levels. Agriculture experts believe that if rainfall remains evenly distributed, it could improve food grain output, stabilize food prices, and ease inflationary pressures, which have been a concern in recent months. A healthy agricultural season is also critical for rural demand, which significantly contributes to India's overall economic growth. However, meteorologists caution that while the early onset is promising, erratic rainfall patterns, including potential dry spells or excessive downpours, cannot be ruled out.

Climate change has made weather patterns increasingly unpredictable, and uneven rainfall distribution could still damage crops, impact yields, or lead to localized flooding. Economists are closely monitoring monsoon trends, as the performance of agriculture has a ripple effect on GDP growth, inflation, and rural employment. The early arrival is also expected to boost water reservoir levels, benefiting drinking water supplies and hydroelectric power generation. As the monsoon progresses, policymakers,



farmers, and industries alike are hoping that favourable conditions persist, ensuring both agricultural prosperity and broader economic stability.

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## Kashmir Gets Historic Rail Link to National Network
